

#### ND Scholarships

There are numerous scholarship opportunities that are still available to your son/daughter. Between the Coyote Foundation and the Williston State College foundation, there are many ways to assist with the financing of his/her higher education. Please note that for every Coyote Foundation scholarship, WSC will match dollar-for-dollar a scholarship for Williston State. We had a senior last year receive scholarships in excess of \$10,000 through both foundations to basically pay for his entire undergrad degree at Williston State College.

The main point in this is that in order to get a scholarship, your son/daughter must stop by the career center and fill out an application. Seniors who receive a scholarship are recognized on May 11 at awards night. Don't miss this opportunity to receive funding for your future! The

counselors also have a current listing of the available scholarships in this newsletter as well.

#### Prom

Prom is scheduled for April 30th this year. Prom is a formal event at WHS for couples who have reached their junior/senior year or have graduated from high school. Students bringing a date from outside WHS must complete a form and have the prom date approved by the principal. (All couples must be at least a junior in his /her high school, and under 21 years of age.) All students must wear acceptable clothing to participate in the Grand March and the following dance.

#### North Dakota Scholarship Opportunities

There are 2 opportunities for North Dakota students to academically earn scholarship money to attend any of the post-secondary institutions in North Dakota. Students who receive a 24 composite score on the ACT can receive \$750 per semester for up to four years of post-secondary educational costs. This could amount to as much as \$6000 and once they are in college they must maintain a 2.75 college GPA.

For the Class of 2012 the requirements are as follows. For the Academic Scholarship you must meet the following requirements. 1) 1 credit of Algebra II; 2) 1 credit for a math that Algebra II as a pre-requisite; 3) 2 credits of the same foreign language or Native American language; 4) 1 credit of fine arts or career and technical education; 5) 1 additional credit of a foreign language, fine arts, or career and technical education; 6) obtain a grade of a "C" in each credit or half-credit required for the diploma; 7) have a cumulative gpa of at least a "B"; 8) a 24 on the ACT; 9) 1 credit of an advanced placement course with the examination or a dual-credit course.

For the Career and Technical Scholarship for the class of 2011 and beyond the requirements differ. To receive the scholarship you must meet this requirements. 1) 1 credit of Algebra II; 2) 2 credits of an approved plan of study of career and technical education coursework; 3) 3 additional credits, 2 of which must be in the area of career and technical education; 4) obtain a "C" in each credit or half-credit required for the diploma; 5) obtain a cumulative grade point of a "B"; 6) receives either a 24 on the ACT or earns at least a 5 on each of the 3 WorkKeys Assessments.

The Class of 2012 will be taking the ACT or the WorkKeys on April 27, 2011. This test will be paid for by the local school district. Students have already registered for this test. Ms. Koperski encouraged anyone who had questions to contact her at her high school office at 572-0967.

#### **ACT Registration**

#### WHS HIGH SCHOOL CODE 351-880

The number of students who register for the ACT online has steadily increased each year, nearly half of the WHS students who wrote the ACT last year, registered online. The flier is located in the counselors' office that will guide you through that process. The traditional method of registration can still be done, and those packets are in the counselors' office as well. The benefits of registering online are that you can complete your

registration 24/7; you will get your admission ticket sooner; you will have access to the most up to date list of locations so you can get the best choice of test centers. The cost of writing the ACT is \$38 without the writing and \$48 if you select to do the writing. To register online, go to www.actstudent.org

#### **SAT Registration**

The easiest way to register for the SAT is to visit their site at <a href="https://www.sat.collegeboard.com/register">www.sat.collegeboard.com/register</a>. You will get immediate confirmation of your registration. The SAT is given in Williston on November 6. Deadline to register for this date is October 8.

#### testGear

WHS has had a site license for Choices and testGear purchased by Student Loans of North Dakota. testGear is an online tool that gives students the practice they need to reach their full potential on the college entrance exam ACT. This online learning system adapts to each students needs by targeting their weaknesses and helping them to build necessary skills. Stop by the counselors' office to pick up your instructions in how to use the program. Workshops will be held this fall for students and their parents to attend in order to learn how to best utilize the program.

#### ND Scholars Program

This program recognized outstanding ND high school seniors for scholastic achievement as measured by their ACT scores. Those students who are selected must enroll in a ND college or university and will be awarded an in state tuition scholarship. To be considered you must be scheduled to graduate from a ND high school in 2012, attend a ND college or university and take the ACT on one of the following test dates – December 11, February 12, April 9, or June 11. Information is in the counselors' office.

#### North Dakota Scholarship Opportunities

There are 2 opportunities for North Dakota students to academically earn scholarship money to attend any of the post-secondary institutions in North Dakota. Students who receive a 24 composite score on the ACT can receive \$750 per semester for up to four years of post-secondary educational costs. This could amount to as much as \$6000 and once they are in college they must maintain a 2.75 college GPA.

For the Class of 2011 and beyond the requirements are as follows. For the Academic Scholarship you must meet the following requirements.

1) 1 credit of Algebra II; 2) 1 credit for a math that Algebra II as a pre-requisite; 3) 2 credits of the same foreign language or Native American language; 4) 1 credit of fine arts or career and technical education; 5) 1 additional credit of a foreign language, fine arts, or career and technical education; 6) obtain a grade of a "C" in each credit or half-credit required for the diploma; 7) have a cumulative gpa of at least a "B"; 8) a 24 on the ACT; 9) 1 credit of an advanced placement course with the examination or a dual-credit course.

For the Career and Technical Scholarship for the class of 2011 and beyond the requirements differ. To receive the scholarship you must meet this requirements. 1) 1 credit of Algebra II; 2) 2 credits of an approved plan of study of career and technical education coursework; 3) 3 additional credits, 2 of which must be in the area of career and technical education; 4) obtain a "C" in each credit or half-credit required for the diploma; 5) obtain a cumulative grade point of a "B"; 6) receives either a 24 on the ACT or earns at least a 5 on each of the 3 WorkKeys Assessments.

The Class of 2012 will be taking the ACT or the WorkKeys on April 27, 2011. This test will be paid for by the local school district. Koperski encouraged anyone who had questions to contact her at her high school office at 572-0967.

## PARENTS:

It is your responsibility to let the school know when your child is not going to be in attendance. Your student/students will be considered unexcused until we've received verification from you that they had your permission to be out of class. Please be advised that unexcused absences can impact on your student's grades as they may result in a zero on assignments/tests etc. So please do your part to ensure that your student/students are receiving the grade they deserve by verifying their absences.

And please familiarize yourselves with our 8 & 16 policy (see below). Because as you now have the same information available to you on PowerSchool that we have, we're requesting that you consult PowerSchool frequently to stay up-to-date with your child's attendance. The WHS Attendance Office is no longer assuming responsibility for calling parents regarding all unexcused absences but will try to consult you when we notice patterns developing or suspect that a student is skipping class.

8/16 POLICY. A student must not be absent from a class more than eight times for a semester course or sixteen times for a full year course. As a matter of procedure, the Attendance Office will try to notify parents by letter whenever a student has accumulated five or more non-school related absences in a class. From then on, it is the student's responsibility to monitor his/her attendance to avoid credit loss. Upon a student's ninth absence in

a semester course or seventeenth absence in a full-year course, (excluding absences due to school activities, medical absences supported by a physician's written verification of specific illness, and in-school suspension), the assistant principal will send the parent/guardian written notice of credit loss. If the parent/guardian would like to have the credit loss reviewed, a meeting may be requested with the assistant principal and the Attendance Review Board by contacting the assistant principal within three school days from the date the parent/guardian was first notified of the credit loss. The meeting must be held within five school days of the request or may be delayed if agreed upon by the parent/guardian and the assistant principal.

EXTENUATING CIRCUMSTANCES. Extenuating circumstances will be determined by the administrative office. Students may receive homebound tutor services, prior to, at the time of, but no later than one week following, the absence.

## Pre-Participation and Physical Exam Requirements Updated by NDHSAA Member Schools

At the North Dakota High School Activities General Membership meeting January 28, 2010 in Bismarck, representative school administrators passed an amendment to the NDHSAA Constitution and By-Laws concerning student physical examinations.

Starting with the 2010-11 school year, student athletes participating in NDHSAA sanctioned sports programs will be required to file a preparticipation health history screening and physical examination with their school office prior to their participation on a yearly basis.

Previously, student athletes participating in NDHSAA sanctioned sports were required to have a physical examination every 2 years. The purpose of changing from every 2 years to every year is to protect athletes from any undiscovered health concerns. School administrators passed the amendment 68/7.

Tickets will cost \$30 per couple. Four spectator tickets per Couple will be allowed at \$5 each

The following is the WHS policy for the rules for prom attendants:

#### RULES FOR PROM!!

## NOTICE TO ALL PARENTS, GUARDIANS AND STUDENTS!!!

These are the rules for PROM:

- 1. All attendees must be a Junior or Senior enrolled at WHS.
- 2. Exceptions include:
  - a. Date who is not from WHS you MUST obtain a permission form from the High School Secretaries. The Principal will determine whether a student from another school may attend WHS Prom.
  - b. Date who is not in High School must be UNDER 21 years of age and have a valid High School diploma or GED.
  - c. Date must have NO tobacco, drug or alcohol violations in the past 6 weeks from the date of Prom.
  - d. Permission slips must be submitted to the office no later than 8:00 am Monday, April 25, 2011.
- 3. If a WHS student is currently suspended for code of conduct violation (i.e., tobacco violation, underage drinking, etc) in the past 6 weeks from the date of Prom, they may NOT attend Prom.
- 4. Tickets:
  - a. Cost is \$30 per couple.
  - b. Must be purchased by 4:00 pm, Friday, April 29<sup>rd</sup>, 2011. Tickets will be available at the ticket booth at WHS <u>after school only</u>, <u>beginning April 11<sup>th</sup>, 2011</u>. Do not ask the secretaries for tickets. Students will not be allowed to leave class during the day to purchase tickets.
  - c. 4 Spectator tickets per couple will be available at a cost of \$5.00 each. These are available when purchasing Prom tickets. Additional tickets will be available at the door the night of Prom. (Same price)
- 5. ALL guest students must present a valid picture ID to WHS chaperones before Grand March.
- 6. ALL students must submit to a breathalyzer, administered by WHS chaperones. (See Student Handbook) Refusal will result in immediate dismissal from the event. Failing a breathalyzer will result in phone call to the authorities for underage drinking. No Refunds for cost of Prom tickets will be given in these cases.
- 7. Once the students enter the building they are not permitted to leave. If they do so, they will not be allowed to re-enter the building.
- 8. Parents and spectators are welcome to Grand March. When Grand March is completed, all guests are asked to leave the building.
- 9. Professional pictures are will be taken at Terri Rider Studios before Prom. Students must make appointments themselves. Call TRP at 572-2412
- 10. Dress code is as follows:
  - a. Ladies:
    - i. No backless gowns
    - ii. No midriff showing
    - iii. Strapless gowns must be in good taste
    - iv. No décolletage (cleavage)
  - b. Gentlemen:
    - i. Suit coat and tie, dress slacks
    - ii. No tennis shoes
    - iii. No jeans

# Working together for lifelong success

#### Driver's ed

You can start fostering good driving habits in your high schooler even before he gets a learner's permit. When he's in the car with you, point out safe driving. Examples: watching for pedestrians and other vehicles, making complete stops at stop signs, checking your blind spot before changing lanes.

Mastering a foreign language can help your child thrive in today's global society. Suggest that your teenager practice the language she's learning by weaving it into her day. For instance, she might count steps in German or write her to-do list in French. *Note*: Encourage her to continue taking a language throughout high school.

#### First impressions

When meeting new people like coaches or friends' parents, your teen gets only one chance to make a good first impression. He should stand up straight, smile, and give a firm handshake. He should also introduce himself by name and use the person's name, too. ("I'm Steven. It's nice to meet you, Mrs. Everly.")

## Landing a summer job

Summer jobs can mean more than a paycheck for your teen. Searching for work teaches valuable job-hunting skills that he will use for years to come. Also, colleges—and future employers—like to see work experience on applications.

Suggest that your child start looking for summer employment before the competition heats up. Share these steps.



Your teen can look in his planner and mark blocks of time to hunt for jobs and send in applications. Accounting for the hours in advance will give him practice managing his time and make his search less stressful.

#### Prepare a resume

A good resume should include details about education, work experience (mowing lawns, walking dogs), extracurriculars (math club), and honors (National Honor Society). Having a resume will

show employers that your high schooler is serious about a job. And creating one teaches him how to condense information and highlight qualifications.



Encourage him to ask friends and family about jobs and to call or stop into places he would like to work. Your child can ask to speak to a manager—he'll sharpen communication skills as he explains his desire to work, offers his resume, and asks about job openings. He might also check newspaper ads and teen job sites (try http://jobsearch.about.com/od/teenstudentgrad/a/teenjobsites.htm).

#### Lyrics to learn by

Music can not only entertain your teen, it can also stretch her mind. Suggest these ways your high schooler can "tune in" to learning:

- To work on reading comprehension, have her read lyrics and think about the story they tell.

  Then, she can use her imagination to write a sequel.
- Your child can practice creative writing by making up her own songs. She can use humor in silly rap songs about funny topics. Or she might write serious lyrics to express her feelings.
- Encourage her to explore poetic devices by looking at lyrics. For example, she might find similes (using "like" or "as" to compare two things), personification (assigning human traits to an object), hyperbole (exaggeration), or alliteration (repetition of sounds at the beginning of words).



### Note-savvy

Having good notes to review will help your child remember what she learns so she can do better on quizzes and tests. To get the most out of note taking, suggest that she:

- Keep notes for each class in separate binders or notebooks so they don't get mixed up.
- Date each day's notes and number the pages. Your teen will be able to find a specific day or week easily and keep her notes in order.



- Leave a couple of inches on the left side of the page and at the bottom. Later, she can add questions, main ideas, and observations.
- Pick out important points to write rather than trying to get down every word her teacher says. Definitions, formulas, and facts are key. So is anything the teacher repeats or writes on the board.
- Fill in missing information as soon as possible. Your high schooler might check her textbook or ask a friend for items
- Go over notes each night to reinforce what she learned. €



#### **Video-game limits**

• We recently got a new video game system. How can I limit my son's playing time and make sure he plays appropriate games?

A Experts recommend no more than two hours a day of screen time, including TV, computer, and video-game time.

To keep gaming in check, designate the amount of play that you'll allow (say, 30 to 45 minutes a day). Together, choose certain days of the week as nonvideo-game days to

be sure he has time for other things. You might also require your teen to do homework and chores before play-



ing video games.

To keep an eye on his game time, place the system in the living room or den. Also, check ratings on games brought into your house, including ones his friends bring over, and have him stay away from those that are rated "M" ("Mature") or "AO" ("Adults Only"). ₹\^

#### · Decisions, decisions

From what to wear to school to how to handle friendships, your child's day is filled with decisions. Here are three tips to help him make good choices:

**1.** Teens don't always realize they have choices about how to handle a situation. For example, if a friend is upset with him, your child might think there's no way to make amends. Encourage him to think about his options (send an e-mail explaining what happened, apologize in person, invite the friend to go somewhere).



- 2. Suggest that he consider the outcome of a choice. He may look cool at a party if he takes a drink, but if he's caught, he could be suspended from cross-country. If he doesn't drink, he may lose face with other kids but keep his spot on the team.
- 3. Evaluating past decisions can help your teen make better ones in the future. Once he has gone through with a choice (how to handle a poor grade, which summer program to attend), ask him how he feels about it. If he could go back, would he make the same decision? Why or why not? 🐒

So I decided to talk to her about being a good sport. I explained that good sportsmanship shows respect for the game and the other players. I mentioned some examples of poor sportsmanship, such


