Research indicates that risktaking behaviors in youth may be reduced when teens develop personal relationships with positive adult role models, and this activity is a way to let adolescents know what resources or services are available to them in our community. ### <u>Scholarships</u>

- Please check the counseling web-site at <u>www.williston.k12.nd.us/</u> for more scholarships. As scholarships arrive in the office, they are put on this site. Some of the scholarships can be down loaded and completed on line.
- 2005 SAE Engineering Scholarship Application is in the counselors' office. The deadline for the application is December 1. You must be a high school senior at the date of application, intend to earn a degree in engineering or related science, be a US citizen and meet minimum requirement with regard to grade point average, SAT or ACT. You can also use the on line application at www.sae.org/students/engschlr.htm
- Principal's Leadership Award program offers a scholarship for leadership and service in high school and in the community. This is a recognition scholarship. The application is in the counselors' office. The deadline is December 3.
- The Art Institutes system offers a scholarship for study at their schools. It covers tuition only. The deadline is March 1, 2005. The application is in the counselors' office or on line at <u>www.artinstitutes.edu</u>
- VFW sponsors several scholarships. Check on their web site at <u>www.vfw.org</u> under programs.
- United States Senate Youth Program is for juniors or seniors. This program brings students to the United States Capital to view first hand how our government works. Apply on line at <u>www.dpi.state.nd.us</u>
- Toyota Community Scholars for seniors is based upon academics, leadership and on community service. The deadline to return to the counselors' office is November 22.

- Native American/Alaskan Natural Resource Students Scholarship is offered for high school seniors who plan to study in the area of natural resources. The deadline date is April 1, 2005. Information and an application can be found at <u>www.itcnet.org</u>
- University of Minnesota offers an honors program scholarship. You first must be admitted to the University of Minnesota. Priority deadline to submit your complete honors programs application is January 15, 2005.
- AXA Achievement Scholarship is given to fifty-two students in the amount of \$10,000 and ten students will receive a \$15,000 award. It is based upon how well rounded you are, how determined you are to do your personal best and have demonstrated achievement at a job, sport, or extracurricular activity. The deadline is December 15.
- JUNIORS Discover Card Tribute Award Scholarship program recognizes excellence in high school juniors. The award is based upon 2.75 GPA or higher, special talents, leadership, obstacles overcome and community service. The application can be found on line at <u>www.aasa.org/discover.htm</u> or in the counselors' office. The deadline is January 7, 2005.
- College STEPS program offers a college tuition scholarship of \$1,000. To register for a chance to win, enroll in the College STEPS program. To sign up, go to <u>www.wellsfargo.com/collegesteps</u>. Deadline to do this is May 30, 2005.

## DRESS CODE

## <u>PARENT-TEACHER</u> <u>CONFERENCES</u>

Parent-Teacher conferences are going to be held November 16 and 18. It is a time when teacher and parents can get together and talk about the progress of the student in his or her various classes. It is a time that both teachers and students look forward to with a combination of excitement and anxiety. Part of this anxiety may arise from a sense of being adversaries rather than co-operating parties.

What should be a time of mutual interest sometimes turns into a time of conflict. If teachers and parents see what they have in common rather that what may be dividing them, parent-teacher conferences can be a time to create some good, strong working relationships, regardless of what is printed on the report card.

First, parents and teachers both have the same goal: to have the student succeed and feel good about what is going on in school. In addition to that, teachers and parents are both concerned that the student is learning the skills needed to succeed after high school

Second, parents and teachers both have a unique view of the student. The parents see the student outside of school; the teacher sees the student in school. Many times, this is not the same view. So it is important for both parties to listen to the others point of view to get a more rounded view of the student.

Third, into every life a bit of rain will fall. There are times when there is a problem with a student's grades or behavior. It is in these situations where the two parties really need to communicate and explain what they see happening. This should never be a time of accusation or reproach, but instead it should be a time when both parties listen and then work toward a solution that will not be overbearing on any of the parties involved.

For the most part, during this time all goes pretty well, but something seems to be missing from the whole equation: the student. It only seems natural to include the student in parent-teacher conferences. It is, after all, the student who is doing the work, going to classes, establishing a relationship with the teacher. It is only the student who can talk about what is or is not working for them in school. Often students are as intimidated talking to teachers as parents can be, so having both parties there can often help make things easier, rather than more difficult.

Each year, a challenge is presented to me students. "Come to parent-teacher conferences with your parents so we can all talk together about what is happening in class." I have had some students who have taken me up on the challenge, and it has always proven to be a very useful time. The students come away from the conference with a sense that they are an important part of the process. It gives them a chance to talk about what is going on in school with the other two interested parties. It gives the parent, the teacher, and the student a chance to set goals and create a plan for success. To paraphrase an old saw, it gets everybody on the same page, not just in the same book.

If this is your first chance to attend parentteacher conferences at the high school, we wish you a warm welcome. If you are one of our "veteran parents" and you know a set of "rookie parents", encourage them to come. Take time to chat with them about how conferences have gone for you in the past. It is my hope it has gone well.

Often when I ask my students if their parents are coming to conferences they say, "No." When I ask why, they reply, "They don't care." I would hope all parents would care enough to give up some time to learn more about and have more input into their student's school life. The student may not want you to come, but it seems they notice when you don't!
