ACT Registration

Register on line for the ACT by going to www.actstudent.org With the on line registration, you can complete your registration 24/7 on any computer

connected to the internet and you get your admission ticket sooner. You will need MasterCard or VISA to register on line. Juniors, you are encouraged to write the ACT in April for a number of reasons. You have nearly completed a full year of school and you should be on top of your academics. The North Dakota Scholars scholarship is based upon an ACT score of 29 or higher and has this as a deadline. You will be given opportunities to retake the assessment next year as a senior if you should decide. If you decide not to register on line, the packets are in the counselors' office.

NCAA Freshman Eligibility Standards

If you plan to enroll in any Division I or Division II college or university in the fall of 2005 or after, your NCAA initial eligibility will be evaluated under the new rules as described below.

The new rule increases the number of core courses from 13 to 14. This additional core course may be in any area: English, math, natural/physical science, social science, foreign language or non doctrinal religion/philosophy. There are changes in the Division I initial eligibility index or sliding scale. (See Mrs. Wick for information on this) The 16 core course rule (for the class of 2008) increases the number of core courses from 14 to 16 for Division I only. Students must complete three years of mathematics (Algebra I or higher) and four years of additional core courses. The additional core course may be taken in any area: English, math, natural/physical science, social science, foreign language or non doctrinal religion/philosophy. The breakdown is on the bulletin board in the counselors' office. Computer science is being eliminated as an acceptable core course area for students first entering any college or university on or after August 1, 2005.

Knowledge for College

Articulation

For seniors who plan to attend WSC next fall, this information is for you! Articulation provides a way for students to earn college credit for skills and knowledge gained during high school. Because WHS has an articulation agreement with Williston State College, our students may be able to receive college credit for learning college-level material in high school.

There are three methods of earning college credit – through examination, current first aid/CPR card or by taking a higher level course. The test is given at no cost to you – the level of competency is set by an outside source than WSC – and based upon the score received, you are able to put the course on your college transcript at a cost of \$10 per credit hour. You must attend WSC for at least a year in order to do this. So, if you write the psychology exam, score an "A" on the exam, you are able to pay \$30 (3 credit class at \$10 a credit hour) and have Introduction of Psychology 111 placed on your transcript – now that is \$101.87 vs. \$10/credit hour – you have saved how much?

In the past, courses included College Algebra, Trigonometry, General Chemistry, Composition, Psychology, some business classes and First Aid.

Applications will be in the counselors' office soon in order to take the articulation tests. Watch for further information.

Registration is about to begin for the 2005-2006 school year. Registration started on February 22 for the class 2006 and February 24 for the class of 2007. Registration will begin February 28 for the class of 2008 and March 1 for the class of 2009. All times will be from 5:30 to 7:30.
