Activities

Winter is finally releasing its grip and spring is just around the corner. I want to personally congratulate Mr. Sikes for being named as WDA Speech Coach of the Year. Our speech team has grown by leaps and bounds and they have been bringing home trophies on a regular basis. To Mr. Sikes and the rest of his coaching staff, great job!

Spring Fling is the week of April 3 – 7. Monday, we have a hypnotist appearing in the auditorium at 7 PM. The cost is \$7 at the door and is limited to WHS students only. Tuesday, a WHS band will be performing in the auditorium at 7:30 PM. There will be no cost for this concert. Thursday will be our second annual Dodgeball Tournament. Last year, we had eighteen teams competing in the gym and the students beat the faculty in the championship match. If you did not get a chance to see the outlandish costumes our kids came up with last year, please mark this on your calendar and come out and watch the excitement. Spectators are welcome! Friday, we will be having a Spring Fling dance in the commons area.

Prom is on April 22 at the New Armory. Prom is considered one of the premiere events at WHS and we maintain very high standards with regards to dress code and who may attend. Male participants must be in a suit/tuxedo. Dress styles have changed quite dramatically in recent years. Therefore, female participants have a few guidelines to follow with their dresses. The dress slit cannot extend past mid-thigh. The dress cannot expose skin below the navel or above the bottom rib. The dress must not ride low on the hip. Finally, the dress must be high enough not to expose cleavage. If there are any questions, have your daughter bring a picture of the dress to the office and we can determine if it is acceptable for the prom.

Prom date: your son/daughter's date must be a junior/senior at WHS. If they attend another school or are not in school currently, a form must be filled out at the office for approval.

In order to participate in the Grand March and Prom, each participant must take a breathalyzer test. Since it is illegal for a minor to register any blood alcohol level, a police officer will be on site and any person who registers a positive result will be referred to the police.

New Course Requirements for 06-07

There are two major changes in the requirements for graduation for next year. The math requirement for graduation has increased from two credits to three credits. This will NOT be for the 06-07 senior class. However, next year's juniors will need to take a third math in order to walk across the stage.

Windows Applications is another class that has been added as a requirement for graduation. This course teaches our sons/daughters how to effectively use the Microsoft Office Suite.

Keyboarding is a prerequisite for this course, and in this age of computer

course, and in this age of computer technology, it is imperative that our students know all the basics of word processing, databases, and PowerPoint presentations. The Windows Applications class will be required for next year's sophomore and freshman classes. So, as a review, next fall's junior class will be the first group that must have three math credits in order to graduate and next fall's sophomore class must pass Windows Applications.

Parents, please note the registration information in the newsletter. There will be changes in this year's format. Students and parents will have the opportunity to meet with high school staff in order to complete the colored registration card. The counselors will then have students, at a later date, make their requests for the 2006-07 school year. Parents will be able to go online and then view their child's requests and make any changes. After April 24, no schedule requests can be made using the online system.

STEPS FOR PARENT/GUARDIAN ONLINE REGISTRATION

Students will register online during an assigned class period on the following dates:

April 5 & 6 – Class of 2007 April 7 – Class of 2008 April 10 – Class of 2009 April 19 & 20 – Class of 2010

The following steps will enable parents/guardians to go online and view the class selections that the student has made. The site will be open from **April** 5 until **April 24, 2006** for request changes.

- Go to PowerSchool Parent/Student Access
- Log in, using your log in for PowerSchool
- On the tool bar, click "Class Registration"
- Follow the instructions as given
- At the bottom of the screen, click submit to save. If you do not submit, it will not be saved.

The window will close **April 24**. After that date, no schedule requests can be made online.

- 2) These software products are meant for personal or school purposes. The license does not provide for commercial uses (e.g. the Student Select license does not allow you to use this software for a home business).

"What's Your Standard?"

Teachers like asking questions. There are some we want answered, and some we are glad are not. With the projects being handed in to me lately, I have really wanted to ask my students a question.

"When you are done with your work, do you think, 'This is Excellent!" or do you think 'This will do?"

The student had to have spent all of fifteen minutes on the project, depending on how long it took to cut the paper, tape it to the tiny book, and draw the heart.

The student did the poster in the class before it was due. The student had some good talent at drawing, but I wondered what it would have looked like if the student had spent a couple days on it.

"Is this good enough? My sister looked at it and said you would take it." Indeed I did take it; fortunately the sister did not predict the grade.

At least the projects got done and turned in, and some credit is better than no credit.

He had been a really good kid in high school. He had probably gotten into some trouble like most kids but nothing of major proportion. When he was in class, he did his work, was polite and energetic, and did what had to be done, much of it at the last minute. I had not seen him for a while, so it was fun to run into him again. I asked him what his standard of excellence was.

He is in his first year of college and getting "okay" grades. He said things were going "okay." He was getting mostly C's in classes. He was still doing things at the last minute. "I am just a 'C' student," he said.

"So your standard of excellence is average," I replied. "You should try above average once in awhile. You might learn to like it. It will make things easier on you."

You take your car in for some repairs. It has had a bit of knock in the motor and running sluggishly for a while. You talk to the mechanics and explain the problem to them. Which of the following outcomes makes you feel best?

- A.) As you leave you hear the mechanics say, "Never heard of anything like this before. Guess we better look this one up. Try that big red book."
- B.) When you return to pick up your car, you look at the slip and it says, "Problem fixed: 60%"
- C.) When you go to pick up the car, the mechanic talks to you, explains the problem, shows you any parts that had to be replaced, and assures you that it is done completely right, but if there are any problems to bring it back in to get adjusted.

What is our expectation for our own performance? Do we give it our all, or do we hold some in reserve, like 90% held back, just in case it is needed? Are the expectations that we have for others when working with us, the same we have of ourselves when working with others?

There are days when I am the greatest teacher on the planet. There are many more days when I am not. I try to help my students understand that what they put into something determines what they get for a grade. Many believe that I should just be thankful they handed it in, and I should just give them an A.

We are a society that believes in the following idea: "Give me the most in return for the least amount of effort." A generation or two ago, the idea was "You get what you earn." That last idea has been lost or forgotten.

So what is your standard for excellence?

Pull the Plug!

TV-Turn Off week is in April, 2006, can you pull the plug? Upper Missouri District Health Unit is sponsoring the TV-Turn Off week to increase better health and lifestyles for families. National Public Health Week is also celebrated in April. To highlight National Public Health Week, we are urging all families to turn off the TV, turn on to a healthier lifestyle.

Consider just a few of these reasons why you should turn off your families' TV.

- 1) TV undermines your family time. The average time spent in meaningful conversation by parents/children is 38 minutes per week.
- 2) TV reduces students' reading skills and abilities. Academic performance can be limited by lower reading scores.
- 3) TV contributes to unhealthy lifestyles and obesity. "Couch potatoes" is now a recognized term for inactivity while watching TV.

On average, children in the U.S. will spend more time in the front of the TV (1023 hours) than in school this year (900 hours). Forty percent of families always or often watch TV while eating dinner.

Listed are several tips to turn off your TV. Try these during TV Turnoff week this April.

- Remove the TV from your child's bedroom. A TV draws the child away from the family and distracts them from homework, reading and sleeping.
- Keep the TV off during meals. Meals are a great time for conversation.
- Do not use the TV as a reward.
- Listen to your favorite music or the radio for background noise.
- Don't worry if younger children claim to be bored. Boredom often leads to creativity.

Once you've reduced your TV time, you'll wonder how you ever had time to watch so much, and you'll be getting more family time as well! Celebrate National Public Health Week by participating in a no TV week for your family!
