#### **Scheduling**

Well, it is that time of the year again for you and your son/daughter to contemplate what courses to choose from for the next school year. Currently, we are working on updating the registration guide so that it will be available by early February.

Our goal this year is to streamline the registration process for the core classes. (Science, Math, English) We will be using the expertise of the core teachers to make recommendations for placement in classes. In addition to this, we will be triangulating this recommendation with our NWEA scores from the testing that our freshman and sophomores did in the fall. Finally, we will use the student's grades in the previous core classes so that we have a complete picture of your student's needs. This will also be done with the incoming eighth grade students. With these three pieces of information (teacher recommendation, NWEA scores and grades) we hope to appropriately challenge all students so that they experience a rigorous and relevant curriculum at WHS.

Ms. Koperski and Mrs. Forthun will be setting up times in February for parents to come to the high school to get assistance in class selection. They will also be going to Williston Middle School to work with the eighth graders on a four-year course of study.

#### **Tournaments**

We will soon be getting into the tournament season and it is time to address how to handle attendance if you are going as a spectator. If you plan on attending any of the regional or state tournaments to watch the Coyotes play, you will need to do several things so that those days are excused from the 8/16 and testing policies.

- 1. Have a parent call the attendance secretary.
- 2. Get an <u>advanced</u> makeup slip.
- 3. Have <u>ALL</u> your teachers sign your makeup slip.
- Return the makeup slip to the attendance secretary <u>before you</u> <u>leave.</u>
- Report to a WHS administrator in charge of the activity <u>per day</u> to be counted on the roll sheet.

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Failure to comply with the stipulations above will result in the absences counting towards the 8/16 policy and testing.

The number of students who register for the ACT online has steadily increased each year. Nearly half of the S\WHS students who wrote the ACT last year registered online. The Flier is located in the counselors' office. It will guide you through that process. The traditional method of registration can still be done. Those packets are in the counselors' office, as well. The benefits of registering online are that you can complete your registration 24/7; you will get your admission ticket sooner; you will have access to the most up to date list of locations so you can get the best choice of test centers. The cost of writing the ACT is \$29 without the writing test and \$43 if you select to do the writing test. The deadline for the February 10 assessment is January 5. The deadline for the April 14 assessment is March 9. To register online, go to www.actstudent.org.

### DRESS CODE

#### (at school or school sponsored events)

Students are expected to have appropriate appearance at all times. Inappropriate appearance includes, but is not limited to, the following:

- 1. Excessively torn or tattered clothing
- 2. Clothing which is in poor taste, too revealing (this includes both shirt and skirt length), clothing containing obscene words or pictures.
- 3. Clothing that promotes alcohol, tobacco or bars
- 4. Hooters, Co-ed Naked, Big Johnson, Playboy bunny or similar items
- 5. Spaghetti straps, tank tops, shirts that expose the midriff or décolletage
- 6. Colored hair or body piercing that draws attention from the learning process
- 7. Chains hanging from clothing
- 8. No sheer or gauze fabrics
- 9. Boys sleeveless shirts

#### Violation of the dress code will result in these actions: First offense: Student sent to administrative office and problem is corrected.

Second offense: Student removed from school and put into inhouse suspension.

Third offense: Suspension from school for three days.

Wearing of hats or caps by either girls or boys will not be allowed. Common courtesy dictates the removal of hats upon entering the building as a sign of respect.

#### Violation of the hat policy will result in these actions:

### Mrs. Tracey's Five Rules of School

Throughout her years as a successful student and after many years observing the behavior of high school students, Mrs. Tracey has decided there are four general school rules. These rules apply to ALL STUDENTS in ALL SUBJECT AREAS from high school to college and beyond. Adherence to these school rules can help students become more successful in school and work. They are:

- 1. Be prepared for class! When you walk into the classroom, get all the materials you need for that class. Open your notebook, take out and have ready all writing utensils, have your completed assignment on your desk, open the textbook to the pages you were working on, and place any other materials for that class nearby, if not on the desk. Be seated, quiet, and ready to learn before the bells rings. When you are prepared for class you will not waste class time getting your notebook out if you have to take notes. If you are not prepared for class, you waste you teacher's time if s/he has to wait for you to get your supplies.
- 2. When your teacher talks, listen!! It is so important to listen when your teacher talks. Even if your teacher just seems to be conversing with another student, listen! S/he might be relating valuable information to that student. You don't want to miss anything the teacher says!! What if s/he is sharing extra information for an assignment or test item? If you have big ears you gain that information without asking the teacher the same question twice.
- 3. If your teacher takes the time to write it on the board or put it on the overhead, write it in your notes! Anytime your teacher writes/draws on the board, writes on an overhead, or places a transparency on the overhead and you do not have a handout of that information, write it down!! The teacher makes these efforts to help you learn. Eliminate the need to ask the question, "Should we write this down?" By taking the initiative to get it in your notes. The answer is always, "Yes!"
- **4. Expect anything and everything on a test!** Just because something was mentioned lightly in class does not mean it won't be on a test. Pay attention!! Take notes!! Listen to what the teacher says!! Study it all!! It could appear on the test as test material or possibly <u>extra credit</u>.
- **5. Study every day.** Study for at least ten minutes per class every day. Even if you are comfortable with the content, study anyway. Keeping material fresh in your mind will eliminate the need to study heavily before a test. Reviewing material every day will help you remember longer than cramming. You will be more successful in class if you review daily, you will be quite capable of acing a pop quiz, and you will be well equipped for learning new material.

<u>An American Plaque: The True and Terrifying Story of the</u> <u>Yellow Fever Epidemic of 1793</u> by Jim Murphy (AR 6 pts.)

<u>Dr. Jenner and the Speckled Monster: The Search for the</u> <u>Smallpox Vaccine</u> by Albert Marrin (AR 3 pts.)

<u>The Hot Zone</u> by Richard Preston (AR 16 pts.): The dramatic and chilling story of an Ebola virus outbreak in a suburban Washington, D.C. laboratory, with descriptions of frightening historical epidemics of rare and lethal viruses. More hairraising than anything Hollywood could think of, because it's all true.

<u>Invisible Enemies: Stories of Infectious Disease</u> by Jeanette Farrell

<u>Virus-X: Tracking the New Killer Plagues: Out of the Present</u> <u>and Into the Future</u> by Frank Ryan: Communicable diseases of today and tomorrow are examined.

<u>When Plague Strikes: The Black Death, Smallpox, and AIDS</u> by James Cross Giblin

How about fictional virus terrors:

<u>The Cobra Event</u> by Richard Preston (AR 18 pts.): Dr. Alice Austen, an officer with the Epidemic Intelligence Service branch of the Centers for Disease Control, goes to New York to investigate the hideous and mysterious death of a seventeen year old girl and uncovers a terrorist plot involving the use of biological weapons.

<u>Fever, 1793</u> by Laurie Halse Anderson (AR 7 pts.): In 1793 in Philadelphia, sixteen year old Matilda Cook, separated from her sick mother, learns about perseverance and self-reliance when she is forced to cope with the horrors of a yellow fever epidemic.

<u>Principle Investigation</u> by B.B. Jordan: One man holds the cure to a mutant strain of the Eke virus – one of the most deadly of all. And for the sake of money and power, he's holding the whole world hostage.

### On the Right Foot

#### A Key to Success

They are three good guys. I had two of them in Freshmen English, but the other was a new student to me this fall, though I had heard of him before he came into my class. They had all come to make their final presentations in Science Fiction. They had all gotten an Incomplete in the class during the first Nine Weeks because they had not taken a required AR test on a book. Each of them had procrastinated for a few weeks and then finally got around to taking it. After all of them had finished their presentations, I told them they had each finally passed Science Fiction class.

Then I asked the deadliest question a teacher can ever ask, "Why did this happen? Why did you let yourselves get behind in this?"

They gave me the deadliest answer a student ever gives a teacher, "I don't know."

They all agreed that their lives at school and at home would be easier if they would just put forth a bit more effort. They just can't figure out why they keep doing things like this. Neither can I!

I got an email from the parent of a freshman student who just barely failed English for the second nine weeks in a row. There is a very good possibility this student will pass for the year. I could hear the frustration in the email as they asked me if I thought that their student should get some tutoring.

The key to success in school is not in school. The key to success in school is often in the home.

How involved should a parent become in the "school life" of the student? They can get as involved as they choose. After all they carry the label of "parent" not "friend."

Need some helpful hints for that student that is not meeting your expectations.

1.) Stop asking the question, "Do you have any homework?" We all know what the answer to that question is because we have all used in it the past. Instead ask specific things like, "What are you studying in history?" "What's going on in science?" "I understand you are studying *Romeo and Juliet*, what part are you on?' Now if the answer to those questions is "I don't know," then perhaps it is time for you to have your student get out the books and show you what they are working on.

2.) Require that they spend some time reading with you every night and then talk about what each of you read. This is especially helpful for those students who do not complete all their AR points which are 10% of their English grade. You may not be a reader yourself, but one of the best ways to encourage your student to read is to spend some time reading together and then talking about it. Reading is a habit everyone should cultivate. It is much more relaxing for your student to do before bed than to play video games, which actually have a tendency to raise energy levels rather than slowing them down.

**3.)** Set expectations and consequences and then follow through. Not every student is going to be an "A" student, but it is good to keep in mind that "C" is average" and not "D" as many students believe. Talk with your student about what level of achievement you expect and then come up with a plan to make it happen. The plan needs to have consequences, both good and bad, so be effective. It is also a good idea to write it down and post it so that all parties can refer to it when needed.

Be sure not to let he/she work his/her way around it. If you have taken away the car as a consequence of poor grades, and his/her friends keep picking him/her up to go places, what have you accomplished? Some times consequences are going to hurt, but both sides will live through it.

**4.)** Keep things current. If you want, go the school district website

(http://www.williston.k12.nd.us/) and email the teacher in the class you are concerned about. Another idea is to have your student ask the teacher to write a brief note in a planner or a notebook as to how he/she are doing. You may have to give the teacher a couple days for an accurate report, but make sure you follow through with your student.

It is vitally important that the parent, student, and teacher realize that each is part of the solution, but that if school only happens in school or only stays in school, there are going to be problems.

That is why we here at the school call it "homework."
