The benefits of registering online are that you can complete your registration 24/7; you will get your admission ticket sooner; you will have access to the most up to date list of locations so you can get the best choice of test centers. The cost of writing the ACT is \$29 without the writing test and \$43 if you select to do the writing test. The deadline for the April 14 assessment is March 9. testGear

WHS has had a site license for testGear purchased by Student Loans of North Dakota. testGear is an online

tool that gives students the practice they need to reach their full potential on the college entrance exam ACT. This online learning system adapts to each students needs by targeting their weaknesses and helping them to build necessary skills. Workshops will be held this fall for students and their parents to attend in order to learn how to best utilize the program.

ND Scholars Program

DRESS CODE

(at school or school sponsored events)

Students are expected to have appropriate appearance at all times. Inappropriate appearance includes, but is not limited to, the following:

- 1. Excessively torn or tattered clothing
- 2. Clothing which is in poor taste, too revealing (this includes both shirt and skirt length), clothing containing obscene words or pictures.
- 3. Clothing that promotes alcohol, tobacco or bars
- 4. Hooters, Co-ed Naked, Big Johnson, Playboy bunny or similar items
- 5. Spaghetti straps, tank tops, shirts that expose the midriff or décolletage
- 6. Colored hair or body piercing that draws attention from the learning process
- 7. Chains hanging from clothing
- 8. No sheer or gauze fabrics
- 9. Boys sleeveless shirts

Violation of the dress code will result in these actions:

First offense: Student sent to administrative office and problem is corrected.

Second offense: Student removed from school and put into inhouse suspension.

Third offense: Suspension from school for three days.

Wearing of hats or caps by either girls or boys will not be allowed. Common courtesy dictates the removal of hats upon entering the building as a sign of respect.

Violation of the hat policy will result in these actions:

First offense: Surrender cap to adult requesting the cap. It will be given to administration and given back at the end of the day.

Second offense: Surrender cap to adult requesting the cap. It will be given to administration and parent will need to stop by and it will be returned.

Third offense: Cap will be confiscated for the remainder of the school year. Each subsequent violation will result in an additional cap being taken for the remainder of the year.

CLASS ACTION

This spring, some of the juniors and seniors will be participating in Class Action, a classroom curriculum that takes a unique approach to the serious problems associated with underage drinking. The curriculum presents underage drinking as a communitywide problem, giving students the opportunity to debate the legal intricacies of alcohol-related cases involving teenagers.

Teenagers make individual decisions to drink alcohol but don't always consider the impact their drinking could have on their friends, families, and the community. With Class Action, students will participate in one of six legal cases designed to emphasize community responsibilities and the social and legal consequences of teenage alcohol use. All of the cases are liability cases and involve personal injury or property damage resulting from the following six scenarios:

- 1. The provision of alcohol to minors during a family celebration results in a serious injury because of drinking and driving.
- 2. The use of alcohol by a pregnant teen results in the birth of a child with fetal alcohol syndrome.
- 3. The sale of a keg of alcohol to a minor results in violence between two minors.
- 4. The provision of alcohol to minors at a college party results in the rape of a minor.
- The sale of alcohol to minors at a community festival results in vandalism.
- 6. A football coach's failure to appropriately handle suspected alcohol use by a play results in injuries during a game.

Each student will be on a legal team with other classmates and will research his or her case's topic and present arguments to the class. The class, in turn, serves as the jury and renders a verdict on the case.

This is a time when teens are being bombarded with messages from classmates, friends, movies and TV. It is not always easy for parents and teens to talk about alcohol-related issues. Research shows that teens are less likely to use alcohol when their parents take time to discuss the issues involved with underage drinking and send a strong no-alcohol-use message. I hope this program prompts discussion and active involvement regarding this serious topic, as well as supporting alcohol-free high school years. The classes involved in the Class Action curriculum this year include Mrs. Jeannotte's U.S. History, Mrs. Axtman's Health Careers and Mrs. Slagle's Fitness for Life. You will be receiving a letter if your student is taking part. Please contact me if you have any questions about this program.

On the Right Foot

It's all about the ring!

A couple weeks ago, one of the female teachers was in the girl's restroom while a student in the stall next to her checked messages on her cell phone. Then, as the same teacher is walking up the stairs back to her classroom, she came across a male student on the stairs with his cell phone out checking his messages. Both phones got taken away. This was in the middle of third period. The same thing happened today (2/20).

My question was, "If a majority of their friends are in school, who could have been messaging them?"

Today during English class, a phone went off. The student answered it, got out of his desk, clicked the phone shut, walked back to his desk and complained about how his mom was so stupid for calling him while he was in class.

Communication today in our global society is instantaneous. We can talk to people around the world through any number of means. The most common one is by cell phone. A rarity a few years ago, it seems like everyone has one attached to their hip now, even people who swore they would never get a cell phone now have one. That would be me.

The cell phone is a boon to student's lives and the bane of a teacher's existence. They seem to be everywhere. In a survey taken by Business Week Online the most common usage for cell phones among all respondents was use calendar and address book. That was also rated highest among the 18 – 34 year old respondents but with a higher percentage (56%). It is only the 55 and above age group who actually see a cell phone as a phone.

The policy for cell phones and other electronic devices is spelled out in the student handbook on page 12.

"CELL PHONES/ELECTRONIC DEVICES/GAMES: All cell phones and personal musical devices (walkmans, MP3's etc....) should

not be brought to school. The use of electronic pagers (beepers), cell phones, or similar electronic devices on school property is prohibited. Failure to comply will result in disciplinary action. In the event a student must use an electronic paging device for health reasons, the student and his/her parents must petition the administration for such use."

It is a reasonable policy. It simply asks that students not use their cell phones in the building during school hours. In the case of a family emergency, the parents can call the school and within a minute or so be talking to their child.

So why do we fear being "out of touch?" Short of a family emergency, what could possibly happen that would be so important that it cannot wait until the student is out of the building, either at noon or after school?

I think banning cell phones in school buildings would be a good thing. Recent incidents of cheating using cell phones overshadow the usefulness of the technology. How easy would it be for a kid to do a test in biology, finish the test, then go to the bathroom and text answers to friends who will be taking the test later in the day. Holding them responsible for cell phone usage, or holding their phones; I think that choice is obvious.
